

AMACDT and medical college trainee representatives discuss the review of the AMC standards for assessment and accreditation of specialist medical programs

The first AMA Trainee Forum of the year was held on 14 March 2024. AMA Council of Doctors in Training (AMACDT) Chair, Dr Hannah Szewczyk, facilitated a discussion on *the review of the Standards for Assessment and Accreditation of Specialist Medical Programs by the Australian Medical Council (the standards)*, with trainee chairs/representatives from Specialist Medical Colleges attending.

Reflections and Discussion

Periodic reviews of *the standards* present a valuable opportunity for trainees to provide tangible feedback and advice based on their experiences with specialist medical training programs. *The standards* regulate a broad range of matters across the entire spectrum of trainee experience. The anticipated review of *the standards* in 2024 will be a focus of AMACDT advocacy throughout the year, with this trainee forum informing AMACDT's upcoming work on the issue.

While experiences and concerns differ between each college, trainee committee chairs broadly agreed that areas of focus for the review of *the standards* should include exam feedback, trainee wellbeing, inclusivity of training, flexible training, trainee representation on councils and committees, and financial transparency.

Trainee committee chairs agreed there is a need to ensure that standards and policies are well formulated and communicated, and effectively enforced in an accountable manner. This was particularly pertinent to standards and policies relating to access to flexible training, trainee wellbeing, and bullying and harassment. It was also acknowledged that implementation of amendments or additions to the current standards could have a financial impact on colleges, with increased costs likely be passed onto trainees themselves.

Areas discussed and relevant standards:

- Trainee involvement in college governance (standard 1.1)
- Reconsideration, review and appeals processes (standard 1.3)
- Impact of dissuading subspecialisation for some training areas (standard 3.1)
- Relevance and benefits of stringent research requirements (standard 3.2)
- Flexibility of training and examination, particularly for parents or expecting parents (standard 3.4, 5.1)
- Leave and continuity of access to leave throughout training (standard 3.4)
- Teaching and learning methods, including increased reliance on programmatic assessment (standard 4.2)
- Cost of training and financial transparency (standards 5.2, 7.3)
- Exam feedback, including timeliness and detail provided (standard 5.3)

- Assistance for trainees who are not meeting outcomes early in the training process (standard 5.3)
- Wellbeing, including sexual harassment and bullying (standard 7.4)
- Equity, inclusion and diversity concerns including cultural and gender sensitivities in training (multiple standards)
- Digital health and environmental sustainability (not currently included in the standards)
