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Call for Nominations AMA Public Health Awards

Nominations for the AMA Public Health Awards are now open. The awards, which include the AMA Excellence in Healthcare Award, AMA Woman in Medicine Award, AMA Women's Health Award, AMA Men's Health Award, AMA Youth Health Award, and AMA Doctor in Training of the Year, will be presented at the AMA National Conference in Canberra on 27-29 May 2016.

The AMA Public Health Awards provide well-deserved recognition of the extraordinary contribution that doctors and associated health groups and individuals make to health care and public health.

The awards are:

- The AMA Excellence in Healthcare Award. The AMA Excellence in Healthcare Award is for an individual, not necessarily a doctor or AMA member, who has made a significant contribution to improving health or health care in Australia. The person may be involved in health awareness, health policy, or health delivery.
- AMA Woman in Medicine Award. The AMA Woman in Medicine Award is for a member of the AMA, who has made a major contribution to the medical profession.
- AMA Women's Health Award. The AMA Women's Health Award goes to a
 person who does not have to be an AMA member, doctor or a female but is
 somebody who has made a major contribution to women's health.
- **AMA Men's Health Award.** The AMA Men's Health Award goes to a person who does not have to be an AMA member, doctor or a male but is somebody who has made a major contribution to men's health.
- AMA Youth Health Award. The AMA Youth Health Award goes to a young person between 15-27 years who does not have to be an AMA member or doctor but has made an outstanding contribution to youth health in Australia.

 AMA Doctor in Training of the Year Award. The AMA Doctor in Training of the Year Award is for a doctor in training and member of the AMA, who has shown outstanding achievement in leadership and advocacy.

Australian Hearing launches industry first 40point CPD program

Australian Hearing has developed an industry-first Plan, Do, Study, Act (PDSA) program dedicated to hearing health, titled: Identifying and managing hearing loss in adults and is holding state-based events for Australian General Practitioners (GPs) to find out more.

This 40-point Quality Improvement and Continuing Professional Development (QI&CPD) program is now available to all Australian GPs and their practice teams, to complete in the final year of the 2015-2016 triennium and beyond. "General practices play a vital role in the nation's hearing wellness.

That's why this PDSA program is important in helping practices identify and manage hearing loss in patients," said Wendy Pearce, Head of Clinical Support, Australian Hearing. "This education program is ideal for those GPs wanting to expand their hearing related knowledge and then putting it into practice.

It's also ideal for GPs who may have a high number of mature aged patients, given that sixty percent of the population over sixty years has a hearing loss."

Once GPs have completed Identifying and managing hearing loss in adults, they will be recognised as having completed 40 self-directed Category 1 points.

Through the Identifying and managing hearing loss in adults PDSA activity, GPs and their practice teams can benefit by:

- Increasing their knowledge in hearing and, in turn, improve the services offered to patients
- Helping their patients take early action on hearing loss and as a result, improve their quality of life

- Gaining 40 points towards professional development and completing a Category 1 quality improvement activity
- Using the activity for their practice accreditation

Liberal Gouging Responsible for Tassie's Health Mess

The combined effect of the Federal and State Liberal governments has meant a loss of hundreds of millions of dollars from Tasmania's health system.

The Federal government's own estimates are that Tasmania will be taking home at least \$52M less a year from 1 July 2017. The State Liberals have cut \$160M since they came to office.

The "new spends" in health that Minister Ferguson proclaims are just the result of shifting money sideways.

This goes a long way to explaining why our hospitals are in crisis.

Minister Ferguson tries to peddle the myth that the health system is a bloated problem that can never be solved, but a huge part of the problem are his own government's cuts.

In 2011, the Gillard Government signed up to the National Health Reform Agreement, which meant the Commonwealth would fund half of all state health costs.

The federal Abbott Liberals tore that up in 2014, and now Prime Minister Turnbull seems to be proposing to take out yet another \$400M nationally.

Tasmania will be the sorest losers under Turnbull's model because our population growth is low and our hospital demand is growing at about twice the national average.

We are older, sicker and poorer on average than the big states. Minister Ferguson and the Premier need to stand up for Tasmanians now and do whatever they can to reverse the Liberal Health gouge.

Two in Three People do not Always Check their Blood Glucose as Recommended by their GP

During World Health Day last week, it was revealed that the number of adults living with diabetes has quadrupled worldwide in under four decades to 422 million. Within Australia, approximately 3.61 million people live with diabetes or pre-diabetes.

On top of last week's findings, we now have the results of a recent survey that investigated the current blood glucose monitoring habits of people with Type 1 and insulin-treated Type 2 Diabetes.

The YourSay: Glucose Monitoring Survey, commissioned by Abbott in partnership with Diabetes Australia and JDRF, found that:

- One-third of Australians living with diabetes feel like 'robots' monitoring their blood glucose levels
- 2 in 3 people do not always check their blood glucose as recommended by their GP
- Glucose monitoring survey finds people with Type 1, and insulin-treated Type 2
 Diabetes are tired of having to check their levels
- Only half of people feel that their current method of glucose monitoring gives them freedom in everyday life
- Over 60% of people wish they could take time off from monitoring
