HOW IS YOUR UPCOMING ROSTER?

The Medical Practitioners award requires that rosters be drawn up at least four weeks in advance. This roster should not change unless it's an emergency.

However, the hospital can change the roster with two weeks' notice. If it is less than two weeks' notice, you are entitled to penalty rates of 125% for the first four hours and 200% thereafter.

HAVE YOU RECEIVED THE CORRECT NOTICE OR PAYMENT OF PENALTY RATE?

If not, we have lodged a complaint with the THS and now the Department of Health. We will soon take this to the Tasmanian Industrial Commission if we do not receive an appropriate response.

We are happy to follow up on members who have not received their entitlements. In the first instance, contact the pay office asking them to correct the error. If you do not receive an appropriate response just contact the office with details of the roster, the notice received and response (if any) from payroll. For non-members, they would need to join.

FACILITY FEES

It is widely known the **MBS** freeze is hurting general practice. The costs of running a practice are rising, so it is inevitable that patients will increasingly face gaps because of the **MBS** freeze.

The **AMA** regularly publishes information to members about billing under Medicare and is ready to provide advice to members who find that bulk billing is no longer sustainable because of the impact of Government policy.

Menzies Public Talk Oxygen Needed, Oxygen Delivered

The research and technology helping premature babies

The ability to breathe normally is often the biggest challenge facing premature babies, many of whom need respiratory support including oxygen therapy for some time after birth. Research based in Tasmania combining the fields of neonatology and biomedical engineering is breaking new ground, with a trial under way that uses smart technology to help control the amount oxygen delivered to premature babies, setting them on their way to breathing independently. With refinement, further validation and likely industry uptake, this work has the potential to make a worldwide impact in neonatal clinical care.
