DOCTORS AT ROYAL HOBART HOSPITAL SAY ENOUGH IS ENOUGH!

A meeting of medical staff was convened at Royal Hobart Hospital on Wednesday night to receive an Enterprise Bargaining update. Doctors at the meeting were outraged to learn that the very reasonable requests by AMA were rejected by the government. THS, DHHS and government negotiators have stalled the process.

This is just another example where concerns raised by medical staff are ignored by hospital management. It has been two years since staff last received a pay rise. This is a situation that cannot continue. Respect for the medical workforce and good patient care is necessary in any well functioning health system. Rather than give up, medical staff resolved to implement Level 1 Professional Action in support of patients.

The action was aimed at ensuring the hospital operates as it should by supporting doctors in providing high-quality care to the community.

A report back meeting is scheduled for Wednesday 22 March to consider further professional actions if satisfactory progress is not made. Support for this action will help shorten the dispute and more importantly send a message of concern regarding the future direction of health care in Tasmania.

RURAL PRACTITIONERS ENTERPRISE BARGAINING NEGOTIATIONS - TIME WARP AGAIN...

For RMPs throughout the state, it will be a familiar refrain to say that the THS, DHHS and State Services Management Office between them have not managed to get a handle on your working lives. Negotiations have not progressed. We served our log of claims just prior to Christmas to improve the RMP agreement. The agreement covers approximately 50 GPs throughout the state working in small health services. It approximates to four full-time equivalent positions!

Typically the employers have decided to make offers that bear no resemblance to our log of claims. Rather we are presented with positions such as an offer to provide Family Violence Leave, Bereavement and Compassionate Leave, Maternity Leave and Lactation breaks and facilities.

We are not entirely certain that they understand their workforce. Thanks must go to Dr Mike Lees (Oatlands) and Dr Alex Seidel (Huonville) for their help within the negotiations. It is important that RMPs be heard and both are doing a great job. We are meeting fortnightly for the next ten weeks in the hope that a concentrated effort will lead to a positive outcome.

The Australian Government has provided guidelines to Primary Health Networks for funding low-intensity services for adults with mental illness. Low-intensity services are evidence-based interventions that are targeted to meet treatment needs at a particular time and may be delivered through group, phone or web options. We are seeking feedback from stakeholders about these proposed models of care. More information will be available on the Primary Health Tasmania website soon.

Who should attend? Representatives from the following sectors/organisations are invited to attend: • mental health and psycho-social services (including case managers, clinical service providers, allied health professionals, community sector workers, volunteers) • General practitioners • Aboriginal health providers • peak bodies, not-for-profit and welfare organisations • policy and advocacy organisations • housing and employment services workers • police, law enforcement and justice workers and • carers, family members and consumers. If you are unable to attend one of the forums, you will be able to provide input on-line.

When will services be commissioned? It is anticipated that tenders for these services will be advertised in April for commencement in July this year.
